

Goochland Office of Children's Services

Enacts the Children's Services Act (CSA)

Oversees State funds, combined with local community funds, managed by local interagency teams who plan and oversee services to youth. The mission of the CSA is to create a collaborative system of services and funding that is child-centered, family-focused and community-based when addressing the strengths and needs of troubled and at-risk youth and their families in the Commonwealth.




FY2018 General Fund Budget Expenditures Functional Area













Community Action-CSBG FY 2016-2017 expenditures~\$141,431




Community Action-TANF funds FY 2016-2017 Expenditures totaling \$67,360







During the Fiscal Year 2017 (July 1, 2016 – June 30, 2017), some numbers:




- 529 Requests for Services
- 1,321 people served
- 79 Prescreenings for Involuntary Psychiatric Hospitalization
- 3 classes with 35 people for Revive – administration of Naloxone to overdoses.
- 4 classes with 40 participants for Mental Health First Aid.




- Provided services with a total cost of \$2,251,994, reimbursed \$1,723,053, for a total of \$528,941 in unreimbursed services to the uninsured. 24% of the services provided are unreimbursed by any payor source.
- Provided \$20,925 in no cost psychiatric medications to uninsured people.
- Helped 25 people obtain GAP insurance – covers medications and some medical costs.
- In cooperation with Social Services, coordinated Family Treatment Court.
- Served 63 people who have Developmental Disabilities Waiver funding.

- Implementation of STEP-VA – Same Day Access
- Financial Realignment, changing the way the state funds services and how State Hospital Beds are paid for.
- State and Federal insurance questions..
- Workforce issues, increasing need for licensed and credentialed people to fill roles.
- Federal Grant for Prevention and Treatment for Opioid Addiction - \$100,000 for Prevention, \$41,463 for Treatment, to be used by 4/30/18.





Strengthen relationship between customers, the community and the Library: Emphasize utilization by the Family Relationship Cluster to develop new Library users

- Bestseller Collection-the Library added a no-holds Bestseller collection in all 10 branches to provide bestselling books that would be available in the branch to be checked out on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Added Hoopla; a resource for digital media in many formats, which provides good promotional materials, always available
- Oversight of the Collection – staffing was added to better control the collection and to match it to the needs and desires of the Library’s specific clientele, and to increase collection velocity.

Encourage Digital Usage by increasing the items available and promoting their utilization
Encourage the use of technology to increase efficiency in library service

- Added new audiovisual equipment for use by Library users in meeting room and quiet study rooms
- New Website and Catalog to launch in Jan 2018 to encourage use and easy downloading of digital materials.
- Adding new software by which customers may reserve for meeting room/quiet study rooms
- Regular upgrades to computer systems

- Reference Librarians provide “Drop-in” help with devices to assist with transition and encourage usage
- Reference Librarians provide Reference on Demand for scheduled, one-on-one help

Encourage all to use its services by providing access to high quality facilities
Expand destination usage to deepen and strengthen customer relationships

- Building updates– recent examples include:
 - Adding new audiovisual equipment for use by Library users in meeting room and quiet study rooms
 - Painting interior of building
 - Glass window were installed in the building hallway to open up the area where the restrooms reside, and into the meeting room for better visual oversight
 - Outdoor lighting added over exterior meeting room door
 - Staff participated in training session on safety



Strengthen relationship between customers, the community and the Library: Emphasize utilization by the Family Relationship Cluster to develop new Library users

Summer Reading Program – engaged the Library, Friends of the Goochland Branch Library, and Goochland County Public Schools in a Community Literacy Partnership that resulted in high sign-ups in the program, increasing overall sign-up numbers substantially from the previous years when the partnership did not exist.



Community Service



- ▶ School Requirements- GHS requires 30 hours of volunteering for final projects. We see 2-5 student projects done per year.
- ▶ Clubs- National Honor Society, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Rotary, etc. Typically have 5-10 volunteers per year.
- ▶ Mandated by Courts- Traffic Tickets, etc. 5-10 people per year.

Law Enforcement and Court System

- ▶ The sheriff's department hands out our DV pamphlets when on a domestic violence call. They also help by patrolling areas/family homes when requested. We often have clients in common.
- ▶ GFCFS works with the Commonwealth Attorney on the SART (Sexual Assault Response Team) program. We periodically become a "go between" between the court system and our clients.
- ▶ We work with a Goochland based attorney to help our clients with DV legal issues.
- ▶ The Department of Corrections brings inmates at a minimum of twice per month. They help with special projects around six times per year. With the upcoming move to the new building the D.O.C. will be providing help with moving.

Faith Community



- ▶ Churches provide food, CC donations and/or volunteer time
- ▶ Special drives for needed items (coats, food, toys)
- ▶ Hope Church, Grace Episcopal, Ragland Memorial, Byrd Presbyterian, St. Mary's, Chinese Baptist, First Union Baptist, Ebenezer Church, Second Union Baptist and Hebron Presbyterian.
- ▶ Work with Goochland Christian Church Association

Individual Engagement



- ▶ 400+ volunteers that are not associated with specific organizations. Roughly 180 volunteer on a regular basis.
- ▶ Virginia House and Monacan Services both provide services geared toward citizens with disabilities. Their clients routinely volunteer their time to help the community.
